Since I am within an hour and a half radius of the beautiful Chicano park I hope to be able to one day go and see the beauty of this park for myself.

The Chicano movement began in the year 1960 when they started to get more involved in the American history which was a big year for civil rights overall. When the movement started it was considered to be one of the movements that was least studied one out of all the movement that went on in those years of the 1960 era. This movement was geared more toward the getting the land grants restored as well as helping the farm workers to get rights as well as attainting the right to vote and the politic aspect of the movement and getting them to be able to get the education that the Chicanos deserve. In the Chicano movement, they had the quest of the homeland which was geared more towards the beginning of the movement when on of the leaders in the movement Lopez Tijerina was working to get the land grant starting in the state of New Mexico in the years 1966 and 1967. Tijerina was also fighting for the government to have them still use and honor the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo which would gavinalize the Mexican Americans that were living in the southwest.

In the Chicano movement Cesar Chavez played a big part in the trying to get the fields to how they should be. He made sure that the farm workers that were in the central valley of the state of California. When Chavez was around he made sure that they would have boycotts, strikes, fasts, etc. for those who the farm workers were working for would know that they did not like the way that they were being treated wrong and that they wanted better rights with the work that they were doing. not only was Chavez encouraging all these acts he also had the goal of committing to the nonviolence in the fields and how important it was to have faith through all those days of fasting and strikes.

Throughout the time of the Chicano Movement they had students that were attending high schools in the city of Los Angeles all get up in the middle of class and walk out because they were being descrimintated against because of their skin color, which personally I think it something that no one should ever be discriminated against being this is not something that we asked to be born with, the skin color doesn't have to do with what type of education that they should be receiving. In the time where the movement was taking place they also had that schools were being separated due to the skin color off the student that was attending which one was getting less of education than the other students because of the skin color. Although this is something that Martin Luther King Jr. had fought and died for they were still going and discriminating what he was about and how they were still separating the students due to color.

Something that was a real eye opener to me during one of the documentaries that was shown in class was when the students that were like us one say were having to change all of a sudden for their race. Something that was surprising was how high the drop-out rate was in the schools because of all the troubles that they were facing because they were not a lot of teachers that wants to teach at the school for the Mexican American students. During these times not only was Cesar Chavez moving for the education for the Chicano they had a political figure show the support for the education of the Chicano based students which was Robert Kennedy. Kennedy had agreed to meet with the student leaders and show them that he was with them every step of the way. Today there are still groups around all college campuses that still focus on the Chicano students which we have one that there are students who are active on the California State University Monterey Bay campus with the organization called MeCHA.

Another aspect that the Chicano movement really helped was in the politics sides of things and that was through the political group known as La Raza Unida. La Raza Unida was a group that was centered more around the Chicano nationalism which was found in the year 1970 and they had supporters that were found more in Texas and Southern California. La Raza Unida had a major goal with was to look at social, economic, and political determination of those with Mexican American descent as well as other minorities.

In terms of all this that I have learned I believe that this will help me in the long run because I will be able to use this to help me better explain things to my family what I have learned because before taking this course I was not aware of what the people that have a similar historical background as me had to go through. When I was in high school I had to write and deliver a speech on a rights movement and I had picked the Mexican-American Civil Rights movement so when it came to learning about this I have already had some previous knowledge of the movement but taking this course has really helped me develop my understanding more and what the people that took a part of this great movement had to go through in order for us to have the education rights that we currently have and that we are able to go to a school or any school in general that we are able to have professors that are Mexican American and that we are able to have people of other ethnicity and backgrounds combined in our classrooms.
